Undergraduate Research Symposium 2018

Eleven CURes research students presented 9 posters at the 2018 LMU Undergraduate Research Symposium on March 24th. Six of the groups shared their research on the Long Beach Urban Coyote Assessment, while the other 3 were part of a study on female hummingbird metabolism and nesting behavior.

Additionally, Dr. Michele Romolini (CURes Director of Research) had 5 students present posters through her Environmental Scholars Research Course. These students shared research on a variety of topics including: food waste recovery systems on LMU's campus, the distribution of different food location types in Los Angeles, and the perceptions of potential pet adopters.

Alex Isaev (LMU '18), who is working on CURes' Coyote Assessment project in Long Beach, said he "enjoyed interacting with members of the public who were experiencing some of the concerns the research group is attempting to address in our study and with the research presented on the poster." Kaitlyn Yee (LMU '18), a member of the CURes Hummingbird research team, said she "was proud to share what CURes had been working on because our work has many goals within the realm of urban ecology." David Ramirez (LMU '21), also a member of the Hummingbird team, reflected that "having the opportunity to present my research in front of the Dean of the Frank R. Seaver College of Science and Engineering, Dr. Tina Choe, is a priceless learning experience that I am very grateful for."

CURes is extremely proud of all of our students and looks forward to continuing to engage with undergraduates in the future.

Research Updates

As LMU nears the end of the semester, CURes looks towards late spring and early summer to begin new research opportunities and continue existing projects. Some highlights include:

- A tree survey through the Los Angeles Beautification Team (through Cal Fire), set to begin in April; similar methods will be used as CURes' previous City of Colton Tree Canopy Assessment
- Analysis of mosquito populations and hydrodynamics in the Ballona Wetlands, via a grant by the Ballona Wetlands Conservancy. CURes will have students continue to assist with data collection and implementation over the summer.
- Dr. Michele Romolini will travel to Vietnam for one week in May to participate in a planning session for a future survey of the Mekong Delta.
- Dr. Pete Auger and Maria Curley will assist with data collection in May for a project focused on the possible connection between genetic differences within wolf hybrids and autism in humans, using the animals' interaction with unfamiliar objects as a measurement technique.
- Two LMU undergraduates will participate in a six-week research summer program to continue the Long Beach coyote assessment, focusing on genetic analysis of scat samples.

As always, stay tuned for more research updates!

Education Corner

The CURes team is working with the Gottlieb Foundation to install a hummingbird camera in Beverly Hills. This will be the third live stream camera location that is publicly available, serving as an educational tool and unique learning opportunity. The other feeds are in Burbank, CA and Cape Cod, MA – a fourth camera will hopefully be installed in Costa Rica in the near future.

CURes continues to develop its UrbanEco Lab open access curricula, an upcoming module of which focuses on native gardens and their pollinators. Through this unit, students can learn about the vital role hummingbirds play within ecosystems.

Restorative Justice Panel

Restorative Justice and the Contemporary Catholic

Campus: Restorative justice (RJ) is a theory of justice that can be employed both reactively, in response to conflict and/or harm, and proactively to strengthen community by fostering empathy, connection, and growth. RJ has a range of applications in the field of student affairs including community building, addressing concerns of campus climate, student conduct and bias incidents, civic engagement, inter-group dialogue, and as a tool for problem solving. LMU serves on the Restorative Justice Network of Catholic Campuses (RJNCC) that is working to promote the natural alignment between a restorative philosophy and our Catholic social teachings. This pre-conference will provide participants an overview of how the principles and practices of RJ are currently being used on Catholic campuses as well as training on practical information and specific techniques for implementing RJ on their home campuses.

Mark Wainwright, an educator and environmentalist based in Monteverde, Costa Rica, is visiting LMU's campus in April. He will be giving a range of talks (see first page for details) highlighting his expertise in wildlife conservation. Wainwright has lived and worked in Costa Rica since 1991, currently in the Children's Eternal Rainforest. He serves as a lead or guest instructor for dozens of academic programs each year, primarily for US high school and undergraduate students. He also leads educational trips for non-student adults from abroad, helps with educational activities for Costa Rican schools, and gives training courses to local guide associations throughout Costa Rica.

The LMU summer course to Costa Rica, run through CURes, visits the Children's Eternal Rainforest and participates in programming with Wainwright.
